ATSU targets the military for prospective students. This three-part ad series will run July to September in *G.I. Jobs* magazine.

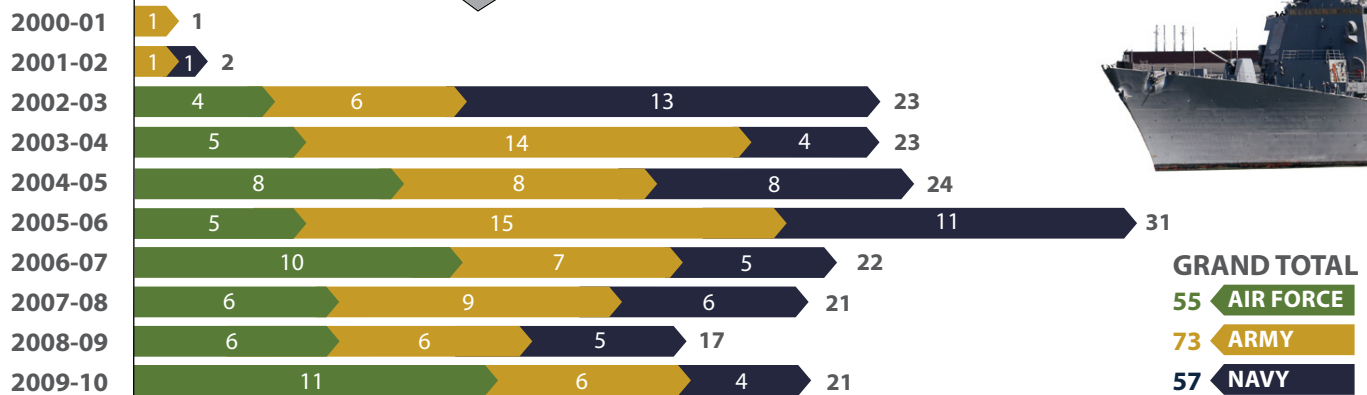


SUPPLY AND DEMAND

Gen. Robb oversees the healthcare services provided by 6,500 AMC medical personnel located at 11 community-based military treatment facilities. He is a graduate of the Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine and is board certified in Aerospace Medicine.

Maj. Gen. Robb also addressed the Missouri campus prior to graduation during a lecture on “Continuum of Care: From battlefield to home station.”
